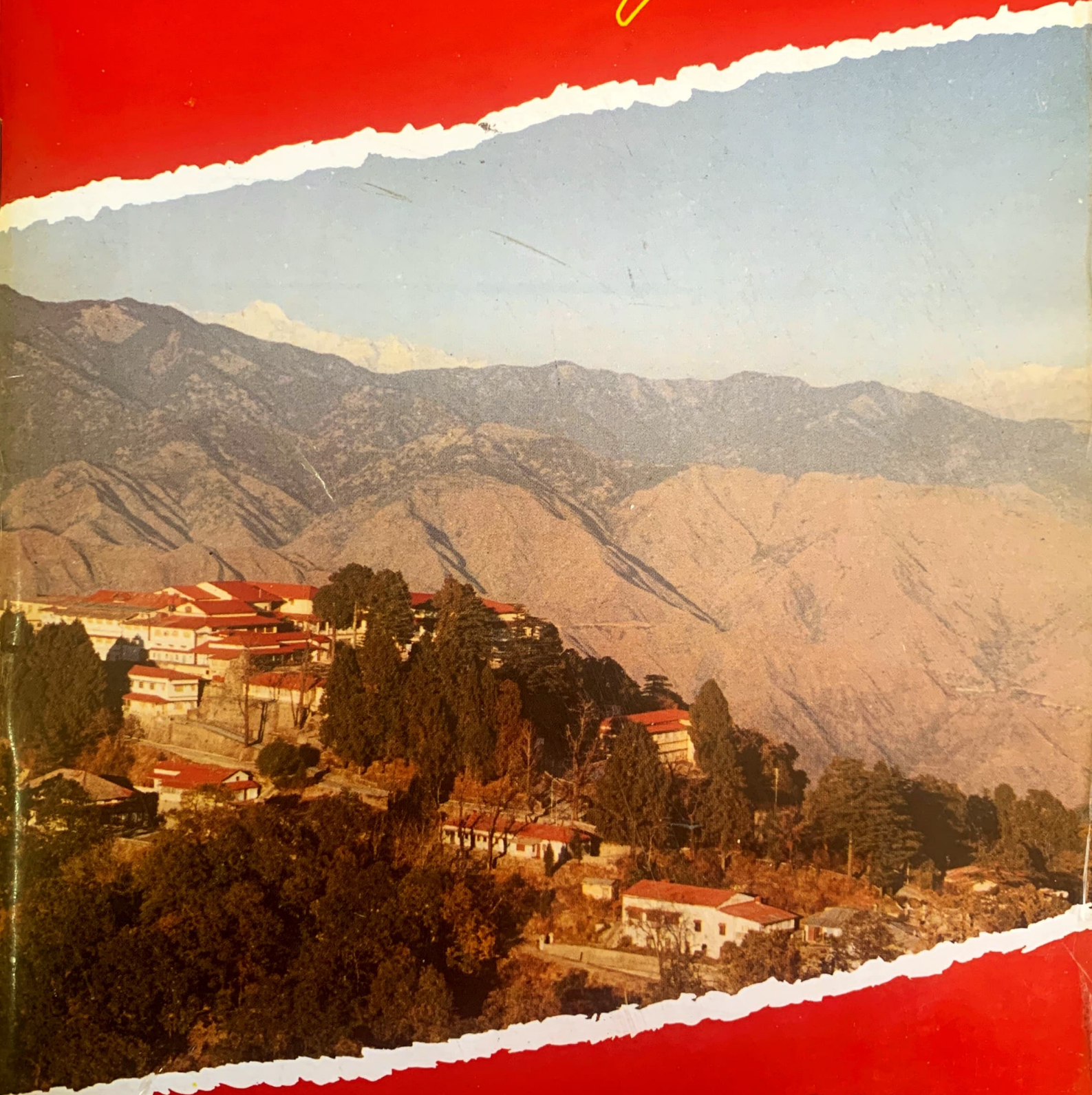
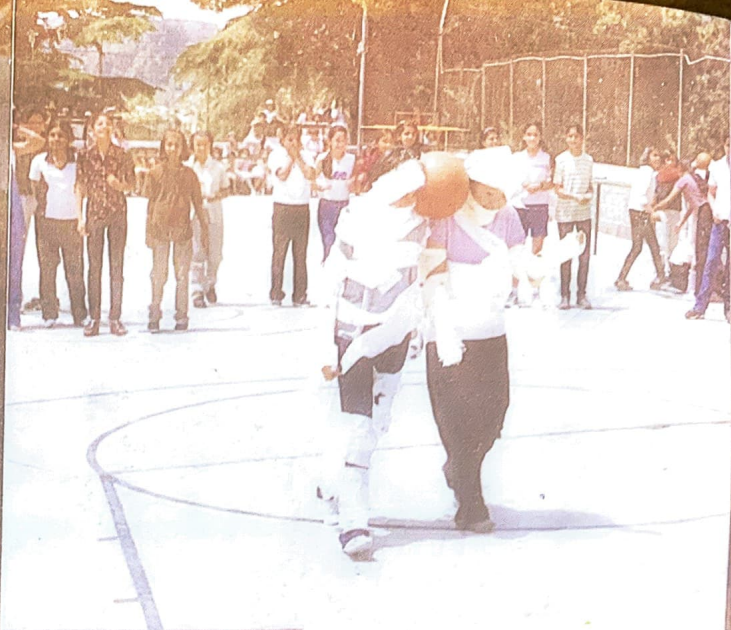

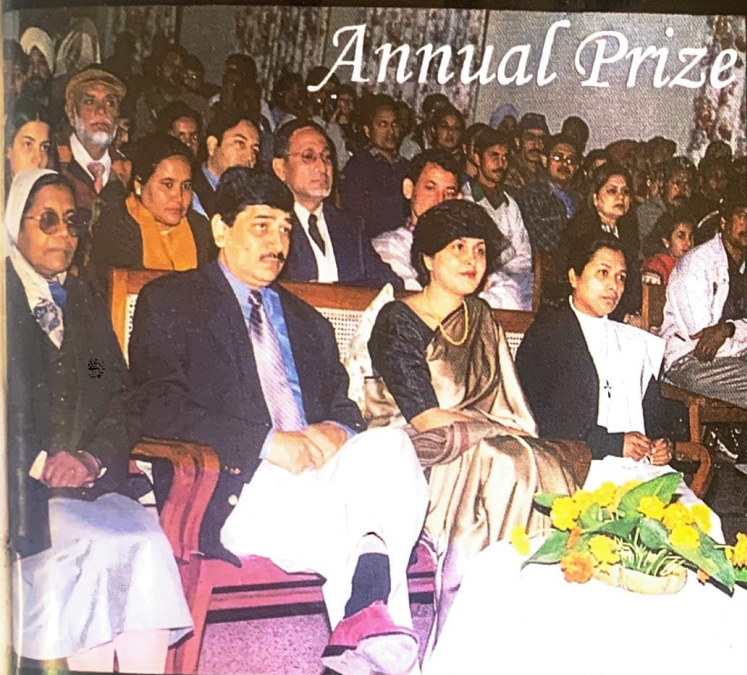
The Annual School Sports were a great success. The colourful displays with varied themes, reflected the innovative and creative talent of 'Waverlites' - the trend setters!

Wonders of the Human Body

The adult human body contains 100,000 km of blood vessels.

One drop of blood contains over 5 million red blood cells along with hundreds of thousands of white blood vessels, platelets and other components. Each red blood cell lives for about 127 days.

In a single day, our blood travels about 168 million miles.

Our brain has 10 billion cells. It can receive more than 86 million pieces of information each day. Scientists say our memory can hold 100 billion facts during life.

It has been calculated that your memory could acquire eleven new facts every second of your life for more than 70 years and still have ample storage space in reserve.

The small intestines of an average living adult are 10 ft. long.

Human retina, a layer of the back the eye, contains 1.3 million light sensitive cells the "rods and cons" so named because of their shapes.

The heart beats on an average of 100,000 times a day, 21/2 billion heart beats in one lifetime.

Our ear can differentiate 1600 frequencies.

Our tongue print is as unique as our finger print.

Our heart beats approximately 75 beats per minute, 4500 beats per hour, 1 Lakh contractions per day, and 40 million times in one year. Over one year lifts the equivalent of 2555 tons. Twenty-five percent of all the oxygen in our body is constantly being used by our brain.

It takes about a tenth of a second for the eye to blink. During an average day, the eyes are closed for over 20 minutes just while blinking.

A nerve impulse travels at nearly the speed of light.

Each kidney has one million filtering units.

The flexible, adaptable foot is the willing work house of the body. Over an average life time of 70 years, the feet transport the body some 25000 miles or 2 1/2 times the circumference of the earth!

The foot has an intricate skeletal structure that consists of 28 bones. The bones of both feet account for one quarter of the total number of bones in the entire human body!!

And for the parents - Understand your children..... They really need you.

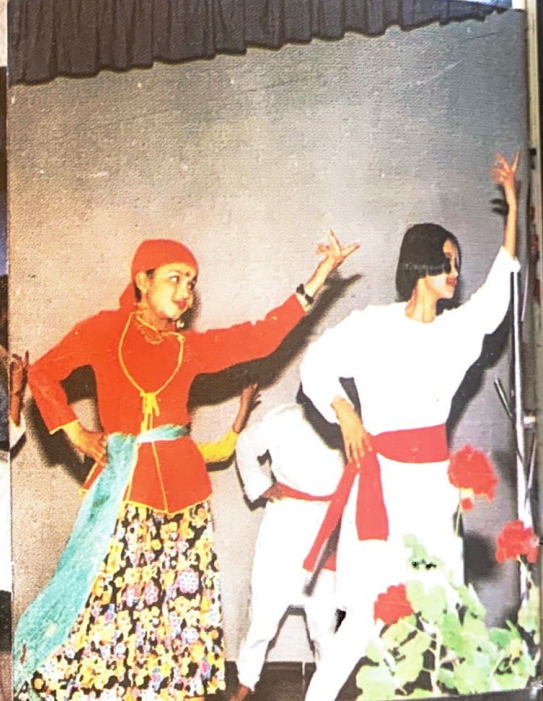

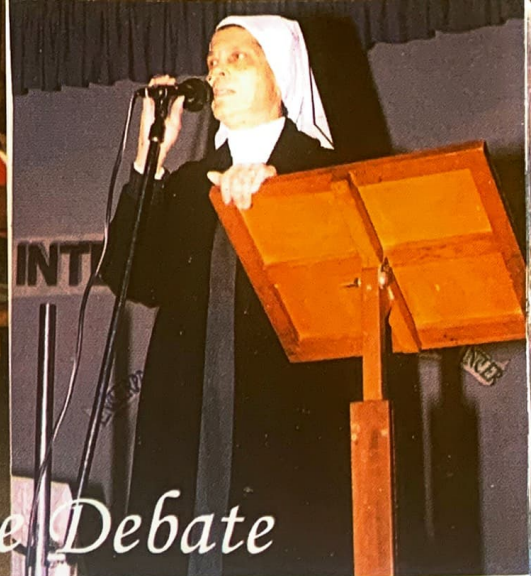

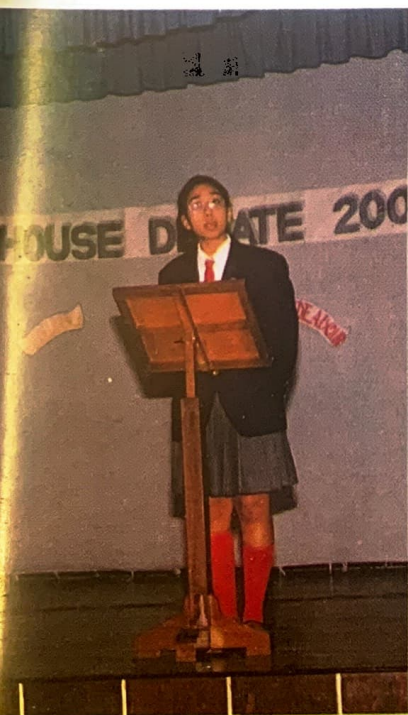

Before you begin, look over the paper carefully. Find out how long it is. Read the questions and quickly assess how much time each is going to take. Pace yourself, leaving time to check your answers.
