
[Rafting - 2004]

The Adventurous Trip to RAJASTHAN







there were beautiful show pieces to buy.


Now it was time to go back to school. The school bus came to pick us up to take us back to school. I am sure that all of us really enjoyed this wonderful trip to Rajasthan.

This year, the book fair was held on the 26th and 27th of April in our school library. Excitement was in the air. The girls were anxiously waiting to buy and read the various books of their choice.




The girls were also given an opportunity to show their creativity in the fair of slogan writing based on 'Books and Reading'. The contest was open for girls of classes 5-10.





The other houses were equally good but as they say - there can be only one winner. Never-the-less, well done yellows!








[A Day of Fun 'n' Frolic] (FETE)


Pryadarshini lit the Waverley Torch, a symbol of high ideals and the glory of sports. The house colours were displayed by their respective house captains.

At Madame Tussand Wax Museum

I visited my cousins living in London, with my family during the last winter vacations. It was a truly memorable experience right from travelling by the British Airways and shopping at the fashionable Malls in London. I was thrilled to see the Madame Tussand Wax Museum.

On our arrival there the courteous staff took our photographs with the statue of James Bond which they gave us on our way out. Let me tell you more about the Museum.

When a figure enters the Museum, the staff remains intimately concerned with its appearance and like every other figure it will undergo on early morning routine of checking and cleaning before the exhibition opens each day. The creation of a life size wax image is completed in a gradual manner. With the aid of the original clay head a perfectly thorough mould of Plaster of Paris is made. Moulton Bee wax is poured into the mould. Bee Wax which is translucent by nature has the texture resembling human skin. Human hair is

inserted strand by strand into the wax scalp or face. The Sculptor carefully applies the colour to bring the face and features to life. The wax image is then clothed appropriately and placed in the wax Museum.

It takes about six months to create a life size wax figure which is also called a 'Portrait'. All figures have their hair washed and styled like anyone else would at a hairdresser's saloon. After every few weeks the clothes are dry-cleaned and put on the wax figures so that they look genuine. The staff meets once a month to discuss which famous person to approach for a sitting.

For all the life size figures on display in the Madame Tussand Wax Museum in London 2,400 lbs (1,067 kg) of wax has been used.

The wax figures are made 2% bigger than real life models because of the fact that wax shrinks. Each figure weighs about 46 pounds.

I was thrilled to see the figures of Amitabh Bacchhan, Pierce Bronsman and Michael Jackson.



Use Recycled Paper

Forests are among the richest expressions of life on our planet. Trees are of course the most visible part of a forest. The other living things that depend on the habitat they create are just as important: the animals, the birds, the flowers the insects and the fungi. Each living thing is necessary to weave, the rich tapestry of forest life, which is the source of so much of our food, fuel, fiber and fertilizer, not to mention medicine spices and people's livelihoods.

When we cut down trees, all these living beings are destroyed, the ground water recedes the soil erodes and the amount of deadly Carbon-di-oxide increases in the atmosphere.

Recycling of paper, by using waste such as used paper, cotton rags and unwanted biomass, helps save trees and minimize pollution.

Today recycled paper is made by school children at their schools and by highly skilled villagers, most of whom are women, and so creates jobs and incomes while saving the environment.

One ton of recycled paper could save three tons of wood and 100 cubic meters of water, and create Rs. 40,000 in wages giving us:

6 trees for life giving oxygen soil and water 3 years of cooking fuel for one village family 1 square foot of land for a waste dump site and 1 month's income for 20 village women.
